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

Statement of operations for period September 1, 2024 to August 31, 2025






Client Demographics

In fiscal year 2025, Nexus Family Recovery Center served over **3,000** women and **200** children. Of the women we served, **96%** were low-income (making less than \$25,000 per year), **46%** identified as persons of color, and **33%** were unhoused at the time of admission.


County of Residence




Primary Substance

Programs



Adult Women Program (AW)

For women ages 18 and older who are not actively parenting



20 days is the average length of stay



1,196 clients served

While in residential treatment, clients' calendars are filled with individual counseling, educational sessions, and group therapy sessions. Our AW clients engage in various activities that target the root of their substance use disorder. The goal is to treat their symptoms as they continue to develop life skills and foster a supportive community of people in recovery.

Shannon's Story

"I started using when I was 18 after I moved out and started working and going to college. It was socially at first. My turning point was when I lost my child to CPS. She was 16 months old. I went to treatment to get my daughter back."

Shannon found Nexus thanks to a family member's recommendation.

"I was so lost and scared when I came into Nexus. CPS had taken my child away and she was my reason for living. Thank God Nexus was there to not only help me but to keep my daughter safe and give her a sense of normalcy while I got my life together. Thank God for recovery that has helped me grow into a productive member of society and a better parent to stop the cycle of addiction. I learned how to get clean - how to be a better parent. Mainly, I learned how to ask for help."




Pregnant & Parenting Women with Children (PPWC)

For women in all stages of pregnancy and mothers with up to three children ages 0-12



31 Nexus-born babies



275 adult clients served

Nexus is one of the few residential treatment facilities in Texas that invites women to bring their children to treatment. Each PPWC client receives a comprehensive treatment plan with parenting and education classes and postpartum support. Alongside a team of licensed counselors, a child and family education specialist, a case manager, and recovery coaches, clients follow a full schedule of activities to support their individualized recovery journey.

Child Development Center (CDC)

Serving infants through school-aged children so mothers in treatment can focus on recovery



242 children served



Fully-licensed Texas Rising Star childcare center

The CDC offers speech therapy, occupational therapy, and mental health services for children in our residential programs. After group sessions are done for the day, children in our PPWC program return to their mothers for the night so they can heal and grow together as a family. In addition to the children of our residential clients, the CDC is also open to children of outpatient clients, staff, and the community.



Medical Detoxification

For clients requiring medically-supported detox due to the severity of their withdrawal



5-7 days is the average length of stay



678 clients served

Our Medical Detoxification program focuses on detoxification and stabilization to help individuals safely rid their bodies of harmful substances while addressing immediate withdrawal symptoms. The program provides medical supervision to ensure safety and comfort throughout the detox process. After completing detox, Nexus's treatment model encourages clients to continue into residential treatment through our AW and PPWC programs, where women receive more intensive therapy and support.

Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)

For clients with opioid use disorder to manage withdrawal symptoms, and prevent relapse



192 clients served

Opioid (eg, heroin, fentanyl) use disorder is a chronic disease that can permanently alter the brain, making dependence harder to break. MAT combines FDA-approved medications like buprenorphine or naltrexone with counseling and behavioral therapies to address both physical and psychological aspects of substance use disorder. This approach improves treatment retention, reduces overdose risk, and supports long-term recovery by helping individuals stabilize and rebuild healthier habits.



One of our clinical assessment tools is the 24-item Behavior and Symptom Identification Scale (**BASIS-24**), a leading behavioral health assessment tool designed to assess the outcome of mental health or substance use disorder treatment from the client's perspective.

Mental Health Services

Nexus's approach involves addressing all barriers to recovery, which includes treatment for mental health disorders. Nexus's clinical providers offer mental health evaluations and medication management to our clients, while our master's level counselors address the needs of each client using evidence-based approaches to treat co-occurring mental health disorders and the complex trauma that may accompany substance use disorder.

Outpatient Program

Primary treatment for women or as a step-down from residential treatment

 447 clients served

Our staff provides individualized plans and support networks for women managing daily living and recovery. By engaging in ongoing group and individual counseling, clients develop coping skills that support sustainable long-term recovery. Each month, Nexus celebrates clients who complete the Outpatient Program with a graduation ceremony helping them to celebrate this major milestone as they move into long-term recovery.

Peer Support Services

Offers experience, strength, and hope to women in recovery

 171 clients served through Sober Mom Squad

Our certified Recovery Coaches, many of whom are Nexus alumnae, help provide creative solutions, practical guidance, and education, as well as employment and housing assistance to women in recovery. Using personal lived experience to connect with clients, Recovery Coaches extend the reach of treatment beyond the clinical setting into the everyday environment of those seeking a successful, sustained recovery.

Recovery Rising

The Nexus Recovery Rising Campaign is an ambitious, five-phased capital campaign that will transform Nexus into a state-of-the-art recovery village by the year 2031.



Phase 1: Stepping into Recovery

The Doswell Medical Building officially opened to clients in August 2025 and forms a new gateway to Nexus's campus, housing Admissions, Detox, and Medication Assisted Treatment.

Phase 2: Moms & Children

Phase 2 will build a new dormitory for our Pregnant & Parenting Women with Children program, as well as a new home for the Nexus Child Development Center.

Phase 3: Adult Women

Phase 3 includes new dormitories for our Adult Women programs, as well as improved group meeting space.

Phase 4: Outpatient & Admin

Phase 4 will upgrade existing buildings for administration and outpatient services.

Phase 5: Community & Support

Phase 5 will create new spaces for community meetings and events.

Doswell Grand Opening

The Doswell Medical Building had its grand opening on May 1, 2025, marking a major milestone in our vision to transform care for women and children in recovery! This 10,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility is the first completed project in the five-phased Recovery Rising campus transformation plan.

Designed by HKS, the facility features expanded admissions, 16 detox beds, private medical and counseling spaces, and more, laying the foundation for brighter futures and greater impact.

The response to the new building has been overwhelmingly positive.

Intentionality is at the heart of the design of the new building, focused on comfort and safety for clients and staff alike. For the first time in Nexus history, staff have a dedicated breakroom to create privacy and a natural boundary with clients. Many clients have shared disappointment in having to leave the Doswell building once they completed detox—highlighting how important construction of new dorms are to create a consistent environment for the families we serve. Admissions is now available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, making us the only all-women treatment facility in our regions that can welcome clients at any hour of the day.

Recently, Erika, who has been unhoused for several months, arrived at Nexus for Medical Detox. She was hungry, tired, and full of shame because of her substance use disorder and her physical state. Our receptionist, Angelia, who is also a Nexus alumna, greeted this client warmly. There was no judgement, only kindness, and she offered her a meal while she waited to be seen by the Admissions staff. This client was able to enjoy the hot meal in the privacy of our client waiting room, again without people looking on and filling in gaps of her story based on her appearance. Once she was admitted, she was able to rest in her detox room and shower in her own bathroom. Of everything she experienced that first day at Nexus, it was the retreat of a private bathroom and shower that stayed with the client.

"I felt whole again. I felt like I wasn't someone to stare at and pity. I felt deserving of the hugs and encouragement I was receiving from the staff. I could look at myself in the mirror and I was able to look my counselor in the eye and let her know I'm ready for the road ahead."


